1.2. SYNONYMS

Words with similar meanings are called synomyms. But nothing in nature is hundred percent identical to anything else. For example, a tree has numerous leaves. At a distance, the leaves appear similar. If we closely examine any two leaves of the same tree, we find that both leaves are distinct from each other. The same principle applies to synonyms. There can be a similarity between two words, but they will never be identical in meaning; there will be nuances of meaning making each one most appropriate in a given context. Such is the beauty of synonyms. Therefore, a word which is more than fifty percent similar in meaning is called a synonym for that word. It is very important to check as to how two words are close to each other in meaning. Then comes the grammatical status of that word, i.e., the synonym of a noun must be a noun, that of an adjective should be an adjective; a verb must be a verb, and an adverb must be an adverb, and so on.

1.3. ANTONYMS

An antonym is a word that means the opposite of another word. For example, the opposite of modern is ancient. But some words have two antonyms: the word 'old' has two possible antonyms: young and new, but the contexts of their uses are different. It is important to know the context and situation of every antonym. The antonym of a noun must be a noun, that of a verb should be a verb, that of an adjective should be an adjective, and that of an adverb should be an adverb.

Antonyms can be formed in the following ways:

- 1. by adding a prefix to the given word
- 2. by changing the prefix of a given word
- 3. by changing the suffix of a given word
- 4. by means of a completely new word
